Whilandian colony of Rugla secured by GBR

MØG, 01-11-316 • Military forces of the Greater Burovian Realm have secured Rugla, a colony of the Erassic republic of Whiland, that was invaded by both the GBR and Zartania following the destruction of the GBR Realms-capital Surina last week.

'The government was officially informed about this action by the GBR. The trade routes from and to our nearby port of Lp were only minimally disturbed; all in all the take-over of Rugla was done quickly and smoothly', a spokesman of the defence ministry said.



Prime minister wants UNV to decide about Tak

MØG, 28-10-316 • Prime minister Mar ob Qaat urged the United Nations of Vexillium (UNV) to take a decision on Tak membership of that organisation. 'Our request to join the worldwide organisation was sent almost eight years ago already; it's time that a decision is made', she said.

But not everyone in Tak is still positive about the UNV. 'They have been awfully quiet in the last couple of weeks, with the nuclear attack on the Realms-capital of the GBR, the peaceful dissolution of Bowdani, and the not so peaceful events that are currently going on in the LUKP', Ɔis ob Keg of the conservative party noŋOŋ Ltens said. 'I agree that joining the UNV gives our country a sign that it has been accepted by the rest of the world, but if the UNV doesn't really do anything significant that could be an advantage for its member states, what would be the point of joining?'

Worries about situation LUKP

MØG, 01-11-316 • The government of Tak is growing increasingly worried about the situation in the Lectern of United Kencari Peoples, the largest successor state of Bowdani in the western part of that former country, after the LUKP authorities seem to be less and less able to exercise control over their territories.

News that the mayor of South Watch has been given house arrest by a growing anti-government group of protesters on Sunday evening and the murder of a campaign leader today in the city of Pearyt has lead to increased activities around the prime minister's office and the defence ministry. A spokesman of the ministry told our reporter that 'minister Fas ob Sin is annoyed that the dissolution of Bowdani didn't prove to be the direct path towards stability that many of us had hoped and that the army is on high alert in case the situation escalates any further'.

Prime minister Mar ob Qaat said that she and her colleagues of the Coare Republic and the kingdom of Bältse requested a meeting with Grand Pensionary Duncan Fairweather of the LUKP. 'Flovaigne and the smaller new countries that were part of Bowdani until a few weeks ago seem to have far less trouble adjusting to the new situation. The ethnic violence in the LUKP indicates however that there has been a serious flaw in the plan. The instability in LUKP is worse than it was before the dissolution of Bowdani; we don't want that near our borders so the government of the LUKP should act fast and decisive!' she said.

The prime minister didn't want to elaborate about the rumours regarding a secret military base in southern LUKP. 'Our intelligence service is cooperating with a number of foreign intelligence services on this matter; if there is something important to tell you, we will.'

Council of Chief Druids to convene

MØG, 25-10-316 • A Council of Chief Druids has been convened in the first weeks of November, it has been announced. It will be the first time since 311 that the Council is organised. It was expected that the Chief Druids would have come together earlier this year to formally reappoint Mar ob Qaat as prime minister. The fact that they didn't, doesn't undermine however her legitimacy as prime minister: not being sacked by the Druids is a sign of their trust as well, although not as convincing as a formal reappointment.

The Chief Druids didn't specify in detail why they chose the beginning of November to come together; they only said that there were some 'urgent state matters to discuss, both among themselves and with the government'.

Day of Fire celebrated throughout the country

MØG, 31-10-316 • As is the case every year on the last Monday of October, the Day of Fire (*Mp ka Qam*) was celebrated today in the entire nation. In many places the traditional torch parades took place, in which children up to eleven years old can participate. Later in the evening there were concerts and festivities, and local leaders rewarded several individuals for outstanding contribution to their respective communities by giving them the typical quintangular Medal of Fire. In the eastern part of the country, bonfires were created, a custom that is not very common elsewhere in the country.

For the Tak, the Day of Fire marks the official beginning of the warm season; the fire is supposed to chase away any remnants of cold and wet weather, and pave the way for Summer to enter Tak.

Inhabitants of Hoop reject design building

MØG, 28-10-316 • The public opinion in the city of Hoop has rejected the design for the new building that the city council has chosen to replace the building that collapsed in November last year. The building, designed by architect Paat ob Jak, is a colourful combination of box-like parts of various sizes linked together by a large hall.

'It's a monstrosity and I won't have it in my city', one man said. 'This doesn't do justice to the memory of those who perished last year when the other building came down.' Most other citizens of Hoop agree. 'I'm not necessarily against these modernist structures, but this shouldn't be built here', a woman explained.

The collapse of an 80 year old building in November last year killed five people and injured several more.
